

“Preserving History: Restoring a Pioneer-era Log Cabin in Munsinger Gardens, a Tribute to Minnesota’s New Deal Legacy”

The Government Rustic Style is seen throughout many of our state parks and gardens. This style developed during the New Deal era when most of the state parks and other public areas incorporated and celebrated the natural environment and used local materials to create borders, walkways, buildings and other features to blend into the natural landscape.

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The building methods and materials used are basic and inexpensive and are features of the Munsinger Gardens that make them unique to the landscape of the outwash plain created by the forming of the Mississippi River upstream from the ice dam further south in the state.

Next time you wander the pathways through the gardens stop, look and let your mind wonder at the native stones throughout the gardens and imagine working crews that were selecting the stones with care and an artful eye to the beauty of each one. Next, discover the wishing well and the log cabin.

The cabin is architectural feature that is reminiscent of the pioneer history of Minnesota. Children especially love visiting the wishing well and the log cabin. The log cabin was originally one of the tourist cabins that had been constructed in the southern portion of Riverside Park. In 1933 the cabins were later moved to other locations in St. Cloud to be used as warming houses during the Civilian Works administration (CWA) projects. The cabin in Munsinger Garden was originally used for the timekeeper of the WPA.

As you travel throughout Minnesota you will see many Depression era parks and gardens that incorporate this pioneer theme, and the log cabin style represents an idealized, romanticized glimpse into that chapter of Minnesota history.

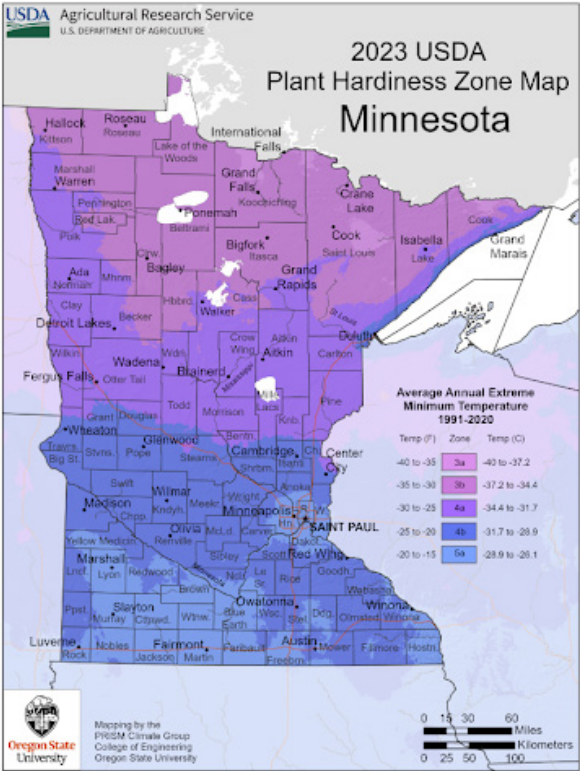


Changes in Minnesota Hardiness Zone Map

Updated Plant Hardiness Zone Map as of November 2023 reflect a Winter Warming Trend by the US Department of Agriculture (USDA). They released a new version of its Plant Hardiness Zone Map (PHZM), updating this valuable tool for gardeners and researchers for the first time since 2012.

It is available online at <https://planthardiness.ars.usda.gov/>. In addition to the map updates, the Plant Hardiness Zone Map website was expanded in 2023 to include a “Tips for Growers” section, which provides information about USDA ARS research programs of interest to gardeners and others who grow and breed plants.

Plant hardiness zone designations represent what’s known as the “average annual extreme minimum temperature” at a given location during a particular time period (30 years, in this instance). Put another way, the designations do not reflect the coldest it has ever been or ever will be at a specific location, but simply the average lowest winter temperature for the location over a specified time. Low temperature during the winter is a crucial factor in the survival of plants at specific locations.



Minnesota increased its zone 5a area, especially in the south and central parts of the state.

A huge chunk of Minnesota is now rated zone 4b (lowest temp: -25) and the area around St. Cloud has shifted from borderline zone 3 to a firm zone 4a.

Zone 5 has crept into much of the southernmost part of the state, which had previously been categorized as Zone 4. The core of the Twin Cities metro area is now squarely within Zone 5 as well.

In the northern part of the state, warmer temperatures are marching north and east. In 2012 much of the northern border region was classified as Zone 3a, but that’s no longer the case.

All told, the latest map suggests winter extreme lows in Minnesota are now between 5 and 10 degrees warmer than assumed back in the 1980s and 1990s.

When compared to the 2012 map, the 2023 version reveals that about half of the country shifted to the next warmer half zone, and the other half of the country remained in the same half zone.
